

Sexual Assault Reporting Options in Alaska

- At any time after a sexual assault a person can seek medical care, including evidence collection.
- Evidence collection can occur up to 7 days after the assault.
- A person 18 years or older* has the following reporting options in the state of Alaska¹:

Report to law enforcement

Choose to:

- Receive a medical forensic exam.
- Have evidence collected and analyzed.
- Participate in criminal justice system.

Anonymous report to law enforcement

Choose to:

- Not have personal identifying information provided to law enforcement
- Not participate in criminal justice system.
- Receive a medical forensic exam.
- Have evidence collected and stored, but not analyzed.

No law enforcement report

Choose to:

- Receive pertinent medical care.
- No evidence will be collected.
- Not report to law enforcement or participate in the criminal justice system.
